GB Railfreight begins Bluebell trials

GB Railfreight (GBRf), the UK's most reliable freight haulier, started trials on Monday 5 July, 2010, for the removal of landfill for the Bluebell Railway.

The trials form part of a project, being undertaken by GBRf and the Bluebell Railway, to reopen an old railway cutting, Imberhorne Cutting, which was closed in the 1960s and transformed into a household landfill site. GBRf and the Bluebell Railway are working together to remove the waste from the site to once again allow trains through.

GBRf is scheduled to run five trains over the initial trial week, and it is estimated that each will carry the equivalent of 100 lorry loads of waste.

John Smith, MD, GBRf, said: "A benefit of using rail for the removal of the waste is that it requires less infrastructure for a site such as the one at Imberhorne, and therefore, for this particular project, it frees up funds which can be put towards finishing the station at East Grinstead."

Once the trial is completed, Bluebell will analyse the train loading and train movement methods. It is likely that a campaign will then start in Autumn 2010 for the removal of some 100,000 tonnes of waste from the old site, utilising approximately 100-110 trains.

Bluebell Railway will open the new station at East Grinstead on Saturday 4 September, 2010.
